Sensory station brings peace to pediatric patients

Samantha's grandson, Magnus, had an eye infection that took a turn for the worse and he needed to go to the emergency department. Samantha and her daughter rushed Magnus to Providence St. Vincent Medical Center.

Three-year-old Magnus has KBG syndrome, a rare genetic disorder. He also had recently been diagnosed with epilepsy and autism. The emergency department can be overwhelming for anyone but especially for young children. According to Samantha, "His senses were on overdrive that night as he was very sick, out of his routine, with strangers, and it was past his bedtime."

As they were waiting to be admitted after being seen by emergency department providers, a Vecta Sensory Station was rolled into his room. The Vecta is equipped with a bubble tube, tentacle lights and a projector that screens soothing images on the ceiling. Magnus was the first person to use the machine given to the emergency department by generous donors.

"We use this tool regularly to help transform hospital rooms into spaces that are calming, interactive and child-focused. This cart truly makes a positive difference for countless kids!" said Beth Wong, lead child life specialist.

"The sound was reassuring, and the lighting was incredible. We witnessed what a comfort the sensory station was to him almost immediately," said Samantha.

Samantha, our Mission services coordinator at Providence Newberg Medical Center, has witnessed our Mission and core values in action.
