Art Therapy helps children express feelings

Children and teens who are admitted to the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Unit are usually frightened and confused. A mental health crisis throws families into turmoil. Anxiety is high – what is happening, why is it happening?

The in-patient unit at Providence Willamette Falls Medical Center cares for children when they are most vulnerable. Among the treatments used to help these children is art therapy. Art therapy can offer a way for them to understand the confusing feelings they are struggling with.

"The art therapy program is focused on stabilizing the children and reducing their anxiety," said Adam Graves, MHP, art therapist. "Using art, we help them make connections to the thoughts and feelings they'd otherwise push away. Through art they can work through those feelings in a way that is more comfortable and safe."

For young children, art therapy it helps them express feelings they might not have the words for or the understanding of. "Family art therapy sessions have been helpful for improving communication between children and their families," said Adam. "Working on artwork and talking about it helps create connections between family members that are otherwise difficult to make during times of crisis."

Jeff has seen integration between the foundation and the hospital increase over the years. "When there is a medical need, we can help support that in pretty short order," he said. One such need was for a cardiac rehabilitation facility at Providence Willamette Falls. "The space for cardiac rehab was small at first, since the hospital didn't know how it was going to go. Now it's turned into a bigger program and has outgrown the space twice."

Birthplace receives new equipment and

training for caregivers

One in 10 babies doesn't breathe immediately after birth and requires resuscitation. Every birth delivery team needs to be prepared.

Most small community hospitals staff must train frequently to manage such a high-risk situation because it happens so infrequently. When they can immediately begin lifesaving measures, they preserve brain development giving the baby a strong start.

Thanks to you, our staff has access to the latest training and telemedicine support for these situations. Your gifts have allowed the purchase

of a special baby-sized mannequin to help our birth teams practice resuscitation on a newborn. Our providers will connect by special video equipment to specialists at Providence St. Vincent and Providence Portland medical centers giving babies the benefit of life-saving specialized care close to home.
