Lynn Lau was vivacious, hard-working, and a loving mother and grandmother. "She was very giving, generous, and kind," said her daughter, Tiffany. "She had a great laugh. And she was fiercely loved by her family."

But when Lynn was 69 years old, she was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. It was a huge shock to her family.

Lynn battled cancer for the next 5 years. She was also caring, full-time, for her disabled daughter. She went through two rounds of chemotherapy and a round of radiation. But eventually, her body started to shut down. Her doctor said it was time to bring in hospice.

As Dennis's health declined, so did his independence – he needed help

Because of you, he was able to maintain his dignity until the end. Thank you!

Dennis Jeppesen loved food. He also enjoyed watching cooking shows. So, when he retired, he took up cooking! It seemed like a natural fit. He also loved boating and traveling. And he loved his dogs!

As much as Dennis enjoyed life and retirement, he struggled with ongoing health challenges. One was diabetes. It led to a toe amputation, which seemed manageable. But the amputation site became infected. And the infection eventually developed into sepsis. After multiple hospital stays, Dennis finally returned home. His health had significantly declined, though. A close friend suggested that his wife, Terry, contact Providence Hospice of Seattle.

A nurse from Providence Hospice visited Dennis and Terry. She determined that Dennis wasn't yet ready for hospice, but he was eligible for Providence's palliative care program.

"Providence Hospice was so helpful," said Terry. "They put together a plan to keep Dennis comfortable. They brought him whatever he needed. Dennis had been developing bed sores. So, Providence arranged to have a special mattress delivered to relieve the pressure on his back. They also helped me get him a wheelchair."

"In addition to helping Dennis, the palliative care team brought me a list of people I could call for support, as well as classes I could attend. I really appreciated knowing there was help out there."

"It was very comforting to have the palliative care team there. Knowing there was someone to turn to, to guide us and help us get what we needed," said Terry.

Dennis's health continued to decline. He was finally ready for hospice.

"I made an appointment for the hospice nurse to visit later in the week, to get him signed up for hospice care. But Dennis died in his sleep early in the week. He surprised us, because his death didn't seem imminent."

Dennis was 84 years old.

"The dignity that Providence Hospice of Seattle's palliative care team brought to Dennis was immense," said Terry. "It helped him feel like a person, rather than someone who could no longer do anything He was always so independent."

"Without Providence and their palliative care program, I would have been floundering. They took it one level above what a doctor can do. They knew what Dennis and I needed. It took a big load off of my mind."

"My mom had retired early to help care for my two kids," said Tiffany. "When she was diagnosed with cancer, they were 6 and 8 years old. They were very close to her. Knowing that my mom wouldn't be there for their big life events was really hard."

Because of generous donors like you, Providence Hospice of Seattle was there to help.

"All of us felt a lot of peace having the expertise of the hospice team," said Tiffany.

Providence Hospice arranged to have a hospital bed brought to Lynn's house. They also brought in additional equipment. They even brought her a "grabber" to help her pick up something if she dropped it on the floor. A hospice aide came regularly to bathe her. Hospice managed all of her medications. They made sure she wasn't in pain. And the hospice team showed Tiffany and her family techniques for turning Lynn, so she wouldn't develop bed sores.

"The most important thing hospice did for us was provide us with peace of mind and knowing what to expect," said Tiffany. "I'm very grateful I didn't have to go through my mom's last weeks alone. Mom really wanted to be at home when she died. She didn't want to spend her last weeks in the hospital. Hospice made that possible."

Lynn died peacefully, surrounded by her family. Soon after she died, her hospice nurse came to her house to prepare her body. She dressed her in her favorite pajamas and head scarf.


"When the nurse was done, my mom looked like she was peacefully sleeping," said Tiffany. "Her sisters and a couple of dear friends and I gathered around her and did her makeup (my mom made me promise I would do her eyelashes after she died!). It was a sweet and special moment for all of us to say goodbye and send her on her way looking her best."

"I am so grateful to the hospice nurse for providing that service and allowing us to collect ourselves and then have those final moments with my mom."
